




# Promoting health and building community through aquatics and wellness programs



### Samantha's Story



Samantha has a love of the water, but she had never been taught to swim and we wanted her to be safe around water and in pools. When we were looking for someone to help us teach Samantha to swim, it was hard to find the right place and the right fit. But we finally found Wendy, the JCC Aquatics Director, through the JCC and Camp Tikvah, the JCC's camp for children with autism. When Samantha first started swimming at the JCC, she wouldn't do certain things – she wouldn't put her head under water, and she wouldn't float on her back. She would have a melt down, but Wendy gave her what she needed. Samantha would try to get out of it, but Wendy knew Samantha had potential. Wendy has not only made Samantha safe, she's completely exceeded our expectations and made Samantha a swimmer.

At the JCC, we've been able to get the individual lessons for Samantha that we weren't able to get other places. It's been about two years now, and Samantha has a very special bond with Wendy. We're so grateful for this!

### Tiffany's Story



I consider myself privileged to be part of the JCC and the opportunities I have been given to experience Jewish culture professionally through my work with Shalom Children's Center. I was nominated and then was accepted into a 3-year fellowship with the Sheva Center Leadership Institute for Early Childhood professionals, with the goal of growing Jewish early childhood education. In 2018, I participated in a 10-day study tour of Israel, during which I was given the opportunity to witness firsthand how innovation, technology, history, and identity intersect to form the foundation for a uniquely Israeli early childhood approach. Here in the States, with the guidance and mentorship of the Sheva Center Faculty, we translate these early learning concepts and concepts about Jewish identity and culture through the Seven Core Elements and the Seven Jewish Lenses. The Core Elements help us structure our approach to include family engagement, intentionality in our curriculum and environments, professionalism among our educators, and reveal Israel as a source and resource for learning Jewish concepts in accessible, everyday ways. Through the Sheva Lenses, the diverse teaching faculty, families, and students of Shalom are provided opportunities to access Jewish values, beliefs, and traditions in ways that are most relevant and meaningful to them. Our "masa," or journey together as a school, is amplified and celebrated as the journey of those who came before us, in many times and many places, yet we strive to never lose focus on the present time and needs of our little Asheville community.

### Koby's Story



Our son Koby has been in childcare at the JCC since he was eight months old, and it has been a wonderful part of our family's life since he started there. My husband Yonton grew up in Israel and speaks Hebrew with his family and with Koby at home, so when we learned that – in addition to being an excellent program – Koby would be able to have extra Hebrew exposure at Hilde's House we were very excited.

We are always especially excited when he learns new Hebrew words, like the day my husband picked him up and he pointed out the "dag" in the classroom, the aquarium! Many of Koby's first words were in Hebrew and it was great to have teachers who could understand and encourage him.

One of the most significant impacts on Koby has been the love of music he's developed. He began to learn and sing the Tot Shabbat songs that the song leader, Penny, sings to the kids every week early on, and we would often hear him singing "I am happy, I am good" to himself on the monitor as he went to sleep in his crib at night.

His love of music became a huge part of our lives when he discovered the toy ukulele at Hilde's House and began playing it at every opportunity. At home he would pretend other toys were ukuleles and "strum" them while he sang Penny's songs.

Eventually we got Koby his own "home ukulele" and more recently a small guitar, and now we are frequently treated to entire set lists of Penny songs. Koby announces "I'm Penny, I'm at the JCC!" and then strums his guitar as he sings "Bim Bam," "Dinosaur Knocking on my Door," "My Roots Go Down," and lots of holiday songs (we are still singing about hamentaschen and trees blowing in the wind!). He always ends his performances by saying "Shabbat Shalom you guys!"
